Saint of the week.....

St John of God (1495 - 1550)

— St John of God with the Archangel Gabriel (c.1672), Bartolomé Esteban Murillo (1617-1682).

He was born to a poor but devout family in Portugal in 1495. After serving as a soldier under the Emperor Charles V he devoted his life wholly to the service of the poor and the sick. He founded a hospital in Granada and a circle of disciples formed round him,



which later became the Order of Hospitallers. He died on 8 March 1550, his 55th birthday.

Liturgy Questions answered by Fr Brendan

Why is there no spoken antiphon at Communion in Alexandra any more?

Clause 87 of the General Instructions of the Roman Missal states (abridged): 'If there is no singing at Communion the antiphon may be recited.' i.e. Singing a Communion hymn (or playing an instrumental) replaces the antiphon. There is no need for both.

What are the Singing at mass priorities?

The most important parts to sing, second to none, are the Gospel acclamation, the Eucharist acclamation and the Great AMEN, because the first highlights the Gospel the second the Eucharist and the third is the high point of the Mass, (because it is a prayer of praise addressed to the Trinity). ... please submit your questions to Fr Brendan

(25 Feb) Pope pleads for just and lasting peace in Ukraine; Children endure dire existence in Gaza. (28 Feb) In meeting with Armenian bishops, Pope Francis commented 'How many conflicts and massacres have we witnessed, always tragic and always pointless? ... The Collapse of Moral Reasoning: An opinion by Bishop Robert Barron (abridged). 'Recently, the presidents of Harvard, MIT, and Penn universities appeared before the US Congress to address the issue of anti-Semitism on their campuses. They were each asked "Would the calling of genocide of Jews constitute a violation of the code of conduct at your schools, yes or no?" Astonishingly each of them balked, insisting that it depended on the context. ... What has made this kind of moral opaqueness and muddle-headedness possible?

First, in the minds of far too many people today, the category of the intrinsically evil act has disappeared. When we lose a sensitivity to the intrinsically evil (e.g. slavery, rape, the direct killing of the innocent, and acts of terrorism) we fall, automatically, into a moral relativism, whereby even the most egregiously wicked act can be justified or explained away.

Second, there is the tendency to divide the world into the simplistic categories of oppressor and oppressed. So those grouped as oppressors are given the benefit of no doubt, while the oppressed the benefit of every doubt.

Might I suggest that the great tradition of Catholic social and moral thought would be a very healthy corrective to the errant speculations evidenced recently in Congress? Was Hamas' attack on Israel intrinsically evil? Yes. Does Israel have a right to defend itself? Yes. Can Israel, in the undertaking of its legitimate self-defense, do so disproportionally and indiscriminately? No. ... The answers given by the University presidents recently were nuanced when they shouldn't have been, and definitive when they shouldn't have been.'
