The Treaty of Waitangi – A Historical Perspective

When the Treaty was signed in 1840, the United Kingdom government did not take the treaty lightly. It insisted that its representatives, the Governors, should observe the terms and conditions to the letter. For a time, under the naval Governors Hobson and Fitzroy, this was done. However their successor, Governor Grey, an army officer, sought to minimize the obligations inherent to the Treaty, and asked the British Colonial Secretary Lord Stanley how far he had to abide by it.

The reply was utterly uncompromising. Lord Stanley wrote:

"... I repudiate with the utmost possible earnestness the doctrine maintained by some, that the treaties which we have entered into with the Maori people are to be considered as a mere blind to amuse and deceive. ... In the name of the Queen I utterly deny that any treaty entered into and ratified by Her Majesty's command, was or could have been made in a spirit thus disingenuous, or for a purpose unworthy. You will honorably and scrupulously fulfill the conditions of the Treaty of Waitangi ..." (From the Commission report by Paul Temm, QC.)

From St John Bosco (feast day Wed 31 January) re correction of children.

My sons, in my long experience very often I had to be convinced of this great truth. It is easier to become angry than to restrain oneself, and to threaten a boy than to persuade him. Yes, indeed, it is more fitting to be persistent in punishing our own impatience and pride than to correct the boys. We must be firm but kind, and be patient with them.

... See that no one finds you motivated by impetuosity or willfulness. It is difficult to keep calm when administering punishment, but this must be done if we are to keep ourselves from showing off our authority or spilling out our anger.

... They are our sons, and so in correcting their mistakes we must lay aside all anger and restrain it so firmly that it is extinguished entirely.

There must be no hostility in our minds, no contempt in our eyes, no insult on our lips. We must use mercy for the present and have hope for the future, as is fitting for true fathers who are eager for real correction and improvement.

In serious matters it is better to beg God humbly than to send forth a flood of words that will only offend the listeners and have no effect on those who are guilty.
