
(1) Isaiah 50:5-9. The prophecy of Isaiah contains four interrelated poems (songs) on the Servant of the Lord, who willingly undergoes suffering and humiliation for his ministry to the Lord. Jesus' own sayings on service and suffering show that he was aware of these songs, and that he saw himself as this Suffering Servant.

(2) James 2:14-18. As the psalms say' No one can buy their own ransom.' All we can do is hang on to God's promises, put our trust in God's limitless forgiveness, and act with similar generosity and forgiveness towards one another. Otherwise, what is the point of good works?

(3) Mark 8:27-35. This is the turning point in Mark's gospel. Till now there has been everincreasing wonder and amazement at Jesus' personality and goodness. Then suddenly Peter comes to the realisation that Jesus is more than just an extraordinary healer, prophet, and teacher; his is in fact the Messiah, the Anointed of God, the Saviour for whom everyone was waiting.

SAINTS OF THE WEEK - Andrew Kim and Paul Chong Ha-sang and companions (20 Sept): For centuries, Korea was closed to all outside influences, and all contact with foreigners was forbidden. A number of laymen sought to find out all that they could about the outside world. Some books about Christianity fell into their hands, and they were converted. The first known baptism is that of Ni-Seoung-Houn, when he visited Peking in 1784. Missionaries followed, in secret; so also did waves of public persecution. Over the 19th century the number of martyrs exceeded 10,000, with many suffering great cruelty. In all, a representative number of 103 Korean martyrs are celebrated today: they are mostly lay men and women: some married, some not; some old, some young.

NATIONAL NEWS:

Treaty Principles Bill: 400 Church leaders, including all three Anglican archbishops, the Catholic Archbishop (Bp Paul Martin) and a Catholic cardinal (Cardinal John Dew), the Methodist Church president, and the Salvation Army Commissioner, signed an open letter to MPs calling on them to vote down the Treaty Principles bill, promoted by David Seymour's Act party. The letter states, "The proposed bill would undermine what Te Tiriti guarantees, ad what decades of law, jurisprudence and policy have sought to recognise." (NZ Herald, 09 Sept)

New Maori Queen has Catholic sacraments: The new Maori monarch, Queen Ngā Wai hono I te pō, is the eighth Māori monarch, continuing a direct lineage from the first Māori King. Notably, at the request of her late grandmother, Queen Te Arikinui Dame Te Atairangikaahu, before her passing in 2006, the new queen was baptised at Huntly by the late Bp Takuira Mariu SM, received the sacrament of Reconciliation at a chapel at Hopuhopu near Ngaaruawaahia, and Confirmation and her first Communion at a Mass on Tūrangawaewae marae. INTERNATIONAL NEWS:

Nearly half of East Timor's population, of 1.35 million people, attended a Mass celebrated by Pope Francis this week. His message was, '...not to be afraid to make ourselves small before God and before each other; to lose our lives, to give up our time, to revise our schedules, giving up something to help a brother or sister become better and happier.'

Churches for Middle East Peace, and Christian Aid, are among 31 leading humanitarian groups calling on all Member States to take urgent steps to protect people deprived of their liberty across the occupied Palestinian territory and Israel.

Human Trafficking:

Persons living in extreme poverty, the Holy See warned are, 'the most likely to fall into the trap of human trafficking and slavery; it is therefore, our collective responsibility to help them find a safe place where they can...flourish.'
