## Ignatius Tran - 3rd Year Seminarian

As the second youngest of three sisters and five brothers, Ignatius has come from a "large and devout" Vietnamese Catholic family. After high school, he studied languages at a university in the city of Hue; he chose English as his major, since his goal was to become either an English teacher, or a successful businessman "who could travel around the world." This goal shifted, however, when at the end of his second year, he received an invitation to come to New Zealand to study for priesthood. Ignatius admitted that along with discernment, it was his tendency to "take risks" that compelled him to say yes, and thus he became a seminarian for the Diocese of Christchurch. His "yes" appeared to be tested almost immediately after he arrived in Aotearoa: "food seemed to be a huge problem," he said. "And now that I'm in the middle of seminary life, time has become a new challenge. Perhaps it's because my time-management skills need work!" In fairness, Ignatius has taken on a number of roles this year, serving as both student president and music liaison at Holy Cross Seminary, and as a student representative at Te Kupenga - Catholic Theological College. When not engaged in these roles, he likes reading, contemplative walking, music, and making artificial bonsai. Ignatius said that "although those hobbies cost me a great deal of time, they really help me to relax. When I walk, I like going under the Harbour Bridge, where I can sit on the park bench and enjoy the sunset."

Ignatius was asked what Catholic saint he would invite to lunch, and he at first jokingly replied that he would bring along "my favourite and patron saint, Ignatius of Antioch...but he might bring some lions with him, and that's not a good idea!" More realistically, Ignatius said he would invite "St. Pope John Paul II because of his knowledge, his virtuous



life, and the way he inspired millions of people. Maybe during lunch, I could convince him to visit my country. Having come from Poland, he would understand the situation in Vietnam, where enjoying freedom and human rights still seems unreachable for many people, due to the political situation."

Ignatius is now in his third year at Holy Cross Seminary, and as he continues his studies and discernment, he asks for your prayers, and assures you of his own.
